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PEER EDUCATION PROGRAMME IN HACKNEY

Smoking is the biggest preventable cause of early death in the UK. In the last twenty years, the number of people who smoke in all age groups has fallen by about 40%. However, most of the fall in cigarette smoking has occurred in the higher income groups. Cigarette smoking is greatest amongst the most disadvantaged groups in the UK. The evidence suggests that smoking rates are particularly high among people who are unemployed and young adults with families, especially lone parents.

QUIT is concerned that health promotion services about smoking are not reaching people from low income communities. We feel that there is a lack of support for people wanting to quit from these communities. Therefore, we are developing a new approach to giving people the facts about smoking and helping them to quit.

We have developed a Peer Education Programme which we will be running in Hackney with the support of Hackney Environmental Services and Cancer Black Care. What we mean by Peer Education is people from low income communities who have successfully managed to stop smoking helping others in similar circumstances to quit.

The Programme offers free training to people who have successfully managed to stop smoking to enable them to work as Community Advisers. This will involve encouraging six people or more to attend a two hour weekly session for six weeks. Ideally, the people coming to the group will be trying to stop smoking (Smoking Cessation). However, in some instances, it will be more appropriate for Community Advisers to run groups where people will be given more information about smoking and encouragement to think about quitting (Smoking Awareness).

The Programme will last 12 weeks, including the training sessions. During this time, we will support the Community Advisers to develop new skills required to run successful groups. After the training, the Community Advisers will meet regularly with the trainer to discuss how the group is progressing. People can discuss any problems they may be having and ask for advice and support from the trainer and the other Community Advisers.

At the end of the Programme, a Certificate will be awarded to participants. We will also meet with all the Community Advisers to find out what they thought of the Programme. We will use their feedback to improve all parts of the Programme and to develop it for use by other organisations.

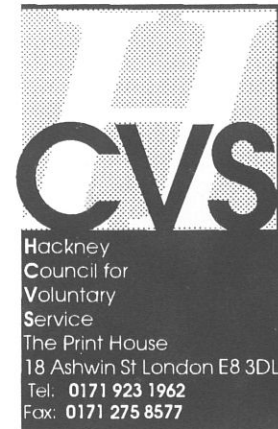

I attended my first Hackney Council committee meeting on Thursday 30 January. Currently there is no one political party in overall control. I am not sure whether I was watching democracy in action whereby there was more power for individual members or organised chaos. The officers looked more and more bemused as the evening went on.

The meeting was initially addressed by the Factory Community Centre who had been put up for a full 100% cut at the last meeting of the Policy and Resources Committee. For this meeting however, councillors were presented with two options. They were either a full 100% cut or about 50% cut and then take £40,000 out of the central corporate budget which supports maternity requests and the training needs of the voluntary sector.

It was clear that members were not happy with the officers recommendations. A Conservative councillor proposed that funding should be cut for Capital Transport and London Health Emergency but that was not seconded. A Labour member proposed a small amendment to the officers report but that was defeated by 5 votes to 3.

A representative from Hackney New Labour then proposed the following:

There followed a lengthy discussion during which there had to be an adjournment because the finance officer present said that the cuts proposed did not add up to the £255,000 they had to find.

Eventually these proposals were put to the vote and agreed by 5 votes to 3. They were about £65,000 short of the cuts target and yet another meeting of the Community Services Committee will have to be held before the 6 March Council (Budget) so that officers can come up with proposals for how they are going to find a further £65,000 cuts.

Watch this space.

New Project Work Pilot in Hackney

What is Project Work?

On 7th November the Secretary of State for Education and Employment announced a £100m expansion to Project work pilots. Project Work is a mandatory back to work programme for people who have been out of work for over 2 years. A new pilot starts in February 1997 in Hackney (1 of 28 new pilot areas). This pilot project will include the full range of Employment Service help including Jobmatch which offers grants to people who take part-time jobs as a stepping stone into full-time work. Local organisations contract with DfEE (Department for Employment and Education) to find placements in host organisations (i.e. voluntary and community groups). The DfEE explained that voluntary organisations have been targeted to enable benefit to the community from the same time whilst minimising the risk of job substitution.

Voluntary sector Issues

In December 1996 an information seminar with the DfEE was organised by NACVS, NAVB and NCVO to discuss the extension of Project Work. The Hull and Medway CVS's were the main speakers at the event. Several voluntary organisations raised the following concerns at this seminar:

- * The initial pilot projects will not be fully evaluated until 1998 - but Project Work is already being extended into Hackney and 27 other areas across the country.
- * There are real concerns over the compulsory and coercive element of the scheme with voluntary organisations potentially facing making decisions that could mean people lose benefits for up to four weeks.
- * Voluntary organisations may find they face additional administrative costs from placements (recordkeeping etc.).
- * The voluntary sector was targeted for providing the placements for Project Work to ensure that paid positions would not be occupied by placements. If job substitution is an issue in the private sector then job and volunteer substitution are issues in the voluntary sector.

Volunteering Issues

There are concerns that projects like this may result in a blurring of distinction between Volunteering and Project Work/work experience. NAVB (National Association of Volunteer Bureaux) and HAVE share the view that volunteers are people who are unpaid and of their own free will contribute their time, energy and skills to benefit the community, without recompense except for reasonable expenses. Therefore, under this definition people participating in Project Work placements are not volunteers. Also, Voluntary organisations may experience difficulties when large groups of Project Work participants arrive and finish together (increases in induction, supervision and health and safety training) and difficulties in filling this gap at the end of the project.

NEWS FROM HCVS

ANOTHER CHANGE AT HCVS

Following the departure of Mike Phillips, I have been appointed to act as a Locum Director in HCVS for three months to the end of March until a new director can be appointed. We are seeking someone who can provide leadership to HCVS and the voluntary sector in Hackney. We need a director who can forge equal partnerships between the voluntary sector, local authorities, health authorities, the private sector and other agencies. In the mean time the staff team has yet again to suffer another change. We will try our best to ensure that the changes will not affect the services we are offering to our community.

These changes have come at a most difficult time of the year when the London Borough of Hackney is making decisions about community groups, changes in the European funding for objective 2 and objective 3 and cuts by the Health Authority. These factors have put an additional burden on the voluntary sector. In the recent study done by one of the trade union organisation on employees in the three different sectors (public, private and public sector), you can guess which sector is suffering the highest working stress - voluntary sector workers.

My time at HCVS is limited and I have been allocated specific work. To some of you I am not new to Hackney. I have been working on and off in Hackney, Tower Hamlets as well as in Newham. I believe that the future lies in the voluntary sector becoming more involved in the economic regeneration of our community, to further develop our culture industry and to become the first borough on-line. This will allow us to share and participate in community information using the superhighway by having access points in community places and developing our local human resources to maintain such resources.

Those groups who are working with special needs, disability, ethnic minorities, refugees in Hackney, don't think small but think big. The voluntary Sector in the United Kingdom and especially inner city communities have a lot to offer the global market. We need to offer our services transnationally and use the income to generate work locally. Local Authorities still have the responsibility of providing the basic services such as childcare for under 5, education, training, health and housing and to provide the capacity building for the voluntary sector.

Partnership between all sectors is crucial for 1997 onward. For example, Hackney Training Network (congratulation for getting the partnership off the ground in good time) has set themselves up as a consortium of training partners getting ready to bid for funding. In partnership, a stronger organisation will be able to help the weaker one. Those organisations which meet their outcome will counter balance groups which have not managed to meet their outcome. This kind of a consortium helps a lot at the time of cuts and problem. Groups must get themselves together irrespective of their differences in order to survive in the millennium.

FUNDING NEWS

THE LATEST ON THE LOTTERY FORUM ON FUNDING

The National Lotteries Charity Board (NLCB) is an independent body set up by Parliament to distribute funds raised by the National Lottery to support charitable, benevolent and philanthropic organisations throughout the UK

The result of Round three, Health Disability and Care, was announced in December. Congratulations to the following groups who submitted successful applications and raised a total of £960, 976 for Hackney.

Anika Patrice which provides support for people from ethnic minorities who have learning difficulties. The three year grant is to help expand the services of the project.

British Red Cross provides emergency assistance and community services. The one year grant is to be used to provide access to their building.

Choice In Hackney provides advocacy services. The three year grant is for salaries and running costs.

Ezer Leyoldos provides in-birth and post-birth support. The three year grant is for salaries and running costs.

Hackney Association for the Disabled. The three year grant will help towards the cost of a lift.

Hackney Bereavement Service provides counselling. The one year grant is for IT equipment and running costs.

Hackney Chinese Community Services provides services to the Chinese community. The two year grant is for salaries and expansion of the services.

Hackney Community Transport. The one year grant will be used to purchase vehicles.

Hackney Foster Carers Association. The one year grant will be used to make the building accessible.

Hackney Muslim Women's Council. The three year grant will be used for salaries and running costs.

Hackney Pensioners Press. The one year grant will pay for a freelance reporter and running costs.

Workforce supports trainees. The one year grant will pay salaries and running costs.

In November 1996 HCVS organised the Members Forum on Funding. This seminar provided an introduction to the Fourth round, New Opportunities and Choices and Voluntary Sector Development. We had a healthy turnout, forty people attended.

As part of our follow up session, Hackney CVS recently held another funding event. The Lottery Application Guidance Seminar on Friday 24 January.

COMMUNITY SERVICE BY OFFENDERS SCHEME

Community Service by offenders scheme has seen many useful and exciting projects in Hackney for the past two decades. Run by the inner London Probation Service (ILPS), the scheme enables offenders to perform useful, unpaid work in the community as part of their sentence. Recently Peter Mavunga, Senior Probation Officer, wrote to SPARK describing the scope of the scheme.

'Done mainly for needy groups in Hackney, the work ranges from painting and decorating, furniture making, environmental improvement, gardening and fencing.

Community Service as a sentencing option was created by the Powers of the Criminal Courts Act of 1973. It was designed to punish offenders by depriving them of their liberty and to enable them to make amends to the community by performing socially useful work.

The nature of the work and how it is done have evolved over time. There are now particular interesting projectstaking place which focus on environmental improvement, crime prevention and education and training.

Offenders are also placed individually in organisations like Oxfam and the Hackney Crime Prevention Panel where they do all manner of retail and office work as required under the supervision of the beneficiary.

What happens in Hackney today, though geared to our needs, reflects what goes on nationally. CS is truly a national service working to agreed standards.

Target hardening, which is about increasing the security of the homes of burglary victims, has been hailed a great success in other parts of London. It is hoped such a scheme will be run in Hackney through CS's participation in the Heart of Hackney.'
