

ore than 70 young people from Hackney hit the red carpet for the launch of docu-drama, Connect Cett4, by Hackney's Fawcett Youth Committee, as part of Elevate's Cett4Film project, supported by Kaspar Films, Cityzen and Hackney Youth Support Team. Young people aged 11-19 applied for funding from the RSA's Award for



Innovation in Youth Provision and Hackney Youth Opportunity Fund and produced the film. The launch was introduced by young people from the project, followed by question and answers with Phil Poole, Partnership Sargent, Hackney Police. Anna Nina Koduah, age 14 said: "After several weeks of coming together and telling our stories and incidents involving police and young people, we decided to make this docu-drama based on our own true stories. n 4 March 2009 Hands Inc launched their Inner Art Programme exhibition at City Hall. The exhibition was formally opened by James Cleverly, the Mayor's Ambassador for Youth. The Inner Art programme was a Self Exploratory Art project funded by Team Hackney and engaged with young people from Hackney who had become involved with crime and anti social behaviour. James said "Programmes like the 'Inner Art' project can help build self-esteem and raise aspiration. The exhibition gives real insight into the lives of the youngsters, especially in terms of postcode rivalry, showing the pride but also the fear and anxiety the youngsters have attached to their postcodes. We need to work with young people on these issues to support and guide them so that they grasp the opportunity to turn their lives into ones of real success."

"Anika Patrice was set up in 1991 by Rani Ogundipe, to discuss new ideas and to

search for a way forward to combat the huge gaps in service provision in the 90s, particularly for people with severe learning difficulties. Initially set up to provide support for people of African, Caribbean, Asian and Turkish heritage, our door is open to all parents and carers who need our services.

I was working as a community nurse when I first met Rani and became very passionate about the work of the organisation. I was in the management committee at the beginning and now I am the Respite Coordinator. Four evenings a week 25 local adults with a range of learning disabilities are collected and taken to our Stoke Newington base. We encourage them to do all the things able bodied people can do – to enable and enhance their individual strengths and meet their needs. We have music workshops, and we are planning a drama workshop, where our users can show what it's like to have a learning disability and a summer residential trip.

We spend one day a week on outreach, supporting the families of our users. Carers can find it hard dealing with professionals, they feel they have become lost in the system. CEN Hackney's community networks

What is Hackney Community Empowerment Network (CEN)? Hackney CEN exists to raise issues in the Team Hackney partnership boards from voluntary and community sector (VCS) networks and groups, speaking on behalf of their membership – to help shape the policy and service delivery of the Team Hackney partners.

Five reasons to join a community network!

- 1. Meet other VCS organisations working in the same field to exchange experiences and build up partnerships
- 2. Join with other groups to raise issues together as a network that you cannot resolve as a lone organisation
- 3. Receive information on policy developments
- 4. Find out about funding and training opportunities
- 5. Meet policy leads from Council, PCT, Learning Trust or Team Hackney.

Won't joining a network take up a lot of time?

Networks hold regular meetings which are advertised in advance, so you can attend if the topic is relevant to you. They also circulate information of interest to network members. On the right are two examples of how, by supporting networks, the CEN has helped some positive changes take place.

CEN Network success!

- 1. Hackney Environment Network
 Through a CEN Cross Cutting Network
 Grant, Hackney Environment Network has
 developed its structure, held the first
 Environment Conference and become the
 key community partner on the Team
 Hackney Sustainable Environment
 Subgroup, helping to influence the policy
 and service from all statutory partners in
 relation to the environment. [see page 14]
- 2. Hackney Turkish and Kurdish Forum CEN supported the launch of this network to bring together small Turkish and Kurdish VCS groups in Hackney. A key concern in this community is young people, who make up one of the largest groups of young people in Hackney and are recognised to have separate needs, including language, culture, particular risks of mental health (such as suicide) and involvement in gang culture. By bringing the Council's Youth Service to their network meeting, they found that out of the 22 members of Hackney Youth Parliament - none are Turkish or Kurdish and only one out of 60 people in the youth forums is. These young people are under-represented in the use of youth clubs. As a result of this meeting, it was agreed that the young people would work with the Youth Service to set up a Turkish /Kurdish network of young people directly linked to the youth parliament – enabling them to voice their needs.

ESOL Forum: This new forum is taking its first steps, thanks to the Community Empowerment Network (CEN) reps who raised ESOL through the Skills Strategy Implementation Group of Team Hackney. We look to forward to working with Team Hackney, The Learning Trust and build on support from CEN and Hackney Community College.

Impact of recession on refugee communities - If you are interested in taking this forward, HRF is meeting again at 3pm, 14 April at HCVS.

Drug & Alcohol research with DAAT - Together with Hackney African Forum, we are researching drug and alcohol use in black and ethnic minority

(BME) communities in Hackney. Twelve volunteers surveyed over 200 people for this project funded by Hackney's Drug and Alcohol Action Team (DAAT). Pictured left are our volunteers analysing this research. The results will be available in June. ■

Pack for Turkish and Kurdish speakers in January. Their innovative projects in Hackney primary schools include: a successful Bookworm project held last year in Princess May school and repeated at Morningside school with an emphasis on environment, a Book club for mums and pupils in Burbage school and a family Numeracy course in Daubeney school. They are also running a GCSE Maths course with Turkish language support with City and islington College. Their Info Pack about education has received positive feedback fromTurkish and Kurdish parents and children, and the Forum has been asked to produce similar projects.

Organisational development and capacity building

Communication, information, advice and assistance

To continue our comprehensive information service so that you get the most up to date information about local events, workforce development opportunities, quality standards, legislation and SPARK!

Leadership

To provide strong leadership to the Third Sector in Hackney to ensure that you are in a position to build greater social capital in the borough and take up and create opportunities to influence and deliver Sustainable Community Strategy.

Creating a fit for purpose Third Sector in Hackney

Measuring the impact of the Third Sector in Hackney (in partnership with Team Hackney) in order to address your support and development needs.

Becoming a Beacon CVS

Underpinning all this policy and development work is a strong focus on becoming a better organisation which means us achieving quality marks such as Investors in People and the NAVCA Standard.

Third Sector Commissioning

Long overdue, the Council's Partnership Directorate will be leading on pulling together a Third Sector Commissioning Strategy closely aligned to the funding principles in our local COMPACT. 

COMPACT: Ever had an issue with Hackney council, the PCT or The Learning Trust over funding?

he COMPACT is intended to encourage more effective partnership working between the VCS and public sectors. Organisations who have signed the Compact can challenge other signatory organisations that they feel have not adhered to the agreed COMPACT principles. A Hackney COMPACT Implementation Group will help resolve COMPACT disputes, many of which are likely to be about funding and premises. Below is an outline of the COMPACT compliance procedure.

COMPACT: Resolution process



If you have a concern about COMPACT compliance, you should talk in the first instance to Hackney Council or Rebecca Clarkson, HCVS COMPACT lead officer who will be able to advise you whether the issue is covered by the Compact and how to process. (i) Visit 'the www.hcvs.org.uk/COMPACT

ackney is a hub of green activity, with many voluntary and community sector (VCS) groups pioneering an alternative way of living. SPARK hears from a handful of these champions about their passion - planet earth and its people.



n the dying embers of the last millenia when carbon emissions, the state of the ozone layer and epidemic numbers of children suffering from respiratory disease, such as asthma was headline news, a couple of parents

at Sir Thomas Abney School in Stamford Hill were racking their brains about how to combat the awful gridlock caused by parents driving their children to school.

The road in front of the school became a solid mass of cars. little children had to thread their way through to cross the road and some were injured. Then ping! They had a light bulb moment. Wean people off cars and onto bikes, teach children to cycle to school. Ping, ping - the light bulb was disco dancing - teach local parents with time on their hands to be cycle trainers. Encourage and teach green, sustainable transport and improve the local economy, provide training and job opportunities to help families work their way off benefits, increase activity levels and reduce pollution at the school gate. Wow! All schools are now encouraged to have 'School Travel Plans' by local authorities.

A decade later, those parents are directors of STA (Sir Thomas Abney) Bikes, a small not-for-profit company and lead partner in a consortium of cycling organisations in Hackney; STA Bikes, CTUK, The London School of Cycling, Pedal Power (a cycling club for young adults with special needs) and Tyssen Community School. Their work has rolled out across Hackney with schools training, community events in parks and estates, Dr Bike workshops, Saturday family cycle clubs, oneto-one training and more. Everything we deliver is free to schools or public. Funding is drawn mostly from Transport for London (TFL), Hackney council and Team Hackney.

An exciting development has been the appointment of one of our cycle trainers - Alison Butler - as Sustainable Transport Manager at Tyssen Community School. Championed by the schools' go-ahead Headteacher, Sue Windross, Tyssen has developed a whole school cycle training programme, paid for and managed by the school. They made use of the cycle pool of bikes established there, and have gone from strength to strength. Alison is the lead cycle trainer, and expanded the provision to include an after school cycle training session for mums from the local Charedi community, local families and children with special needs. y passion for the environment stems from when I lived in the Democratic Republic of Congo. I campaigned against the devstating impact of chemical fertilisers on agriculture. Since coming here in 2000, I trained as a Green Champion with Every Action Counts. I've worked as the Recycling Promoter in Hackney, Havering, Barking and Newham for Waste Watch, and Hackney council to educate people about recycling and the environment.

There is gap in environment education provision to refugees. Most community

groups in Hackney focus on advice, women, recreation, youth activities. These are priorities but we need to invite people be more responsible and engaged about environment issues, because the world we have tomorrow is the one we leave today.

So in 2007, myself and other Congolese residents formed Hackney Community Environmental Project, to help people from

refugee and black and ethnic minority (BME) communities find out about, and take part in environmental education as well as to feed people's views back to Hackney council. We got together a management committee of eight and two volunteers.

In many countries where Hackney's refugee communities come from, the environment policies are very weak and people don't understand how they can take actions. Our first step is with the Congolese community because you start where you feel comfortable. In 2007, we held a recycling information event with a Team Hackney Fast Track Community Grant.

I'm working with Hackney Environment Network to involve more BME and refugee led groups. Hackney council should make use of our services to reach refugee and BME communities. I'd like to see a Green Champion on every Hackney estate to provide general advice, information and practical help, on recycling and environmental issues. There is lots of environment training around, it has so many benefits. Start at home - every action does count! nce upon a time, if we walked into a school and said "We're from an environmental education group" teachers would ask us to do the garden. But over the last decade, as the National Curriculum has gradually been revised, initiatives such as the Sustainable Schools strategy (aiming for every school to be sustainable by 2020) have given education for sustainability (EfS) more status. ecoACTIVE now has 2.6 Education Officers, a part time Coordinator and up to 15 sessional workers and volunteers. Getting three year funding for one of our Education Officers from City Bridge Trust has made such a difference, particularly in planning for long term projects.

Most of ecoACTIVE's work is with

schools, but we also work at community events, with local providers for young people, faith groups, tenants associations and the public sector. I'm proud of our work.

Essentially, we are trying to encourage people to behave differently, and now recycling in Hackney has risen to 24%, I like to think ecoACTIVE has contributed.

In the past, you may have seen Shirley, our electric powered milk float, out with us. Sadly, Shirley gave out last year and due to lack of funding, we won't replace her. While this was a blow, it coincided with ecoACTIVE's new strategy to work more intensively with groups / classes to enable them to be the school's Green Team or eco-warriors who take responsibility for ensuring that systems we set up with them, continue and work. Young people like our active approach although while we try and get the whole school involved in eco-action, commitment at management levels sometimes lacking. >>>

ecoACTIVE initiated development of Hackney Environmental Education Network (HEEN) back in 2005 to try and link all the groups providing EfS with the Learning Trust and relevant Hackney Council Services, who fund us. HEEN is now coordinated by Rob Sambrooks at The Learning Trust, has a comprehensive database of VCS groups and individuals, lead school staff for environment and a record of what each school has done, and runs Annual Environment Training days. HEEN aims to get every Hackney school to bronze level in the international Eco-Schools programme this year. *Interview with* admin@ecoactive.org.uk

inning the first London Tree and Woodland Award from the Greater London Assembly and Forestry Commission last December was a wonderful recognition of the Tree Musketeers who have given a decade of time and love to improving trees in Hackney.



Starting in 1998 as Hackney Tree Wardens, changing our name in 2003, we are a network of over 500 Tree Musketeers who plant, protect and help preserve trees in Hackney. We work with local people, the Council and other organisations to promote the benefits of trees and tree care through education, publications and activities. We are all volunteers and have no core funding.

Our activities take place across Hackney, although we focus on a few sites to achieve long term impact. Our approach to planting works better than most because we put in hours of aftercare and are often on site to monitor any issues. Many people are unaware a newly planted tree needs watering until it establishes it's own root system. Planting is the easy bit.

Stoke Newington Common is evidence of our commitment: we planted our first tree there in '98, and 10 years later there are 65 healthy new trees. The Common has become a focus for local people and a model for inclusive urban tree planting. We worked with Stoke Newington Common Users Group, Smalley Road tenants association, the Divine Youth Group (a local Hindu environmental youth group), Hackney council's TreeTteam, Groundwork East London, Thames Water and local businesses.

We are now working on Hackney Downs, where we have already created a wildlife area, a community orchard and planted another 30 trees. All this needs aftercare so new volunteers are always welcome. We also do free guided tree walks, cycle tours, tree maps and calendars. You can adopt or sponsor a tree and volunteers of all ages are welcome to join us. We also help run the community tree nursery on Hackney Marshes. Interview with Russell Miller, above, Coordinator

issue 12 - Case study of Hampden Street Meals



KISHORE SAYS: **Meet Pauline Akoto** & Sohail Anjum from Hampden Street Meals, a voluntary and community sector (VCS) group who with help from our advice sessions have made great progress.

Q. What is Hampden Street Meals?

Hampden Street Meals is an informal group established in November 2005, as a result of people from Hampden Chapel who shared a vision of helping the homeless in the surrounding area. We began by regularly visiting the homeless, developing a relationship where we listened to their stories and helped where we could - offering food, cloths, shoes and toiletries. We became well known and encouraged them to visit us on Sundays for a hot, nutritious sit-down meal.

Q. Who are the people involved in the group?

Twelve individuals from the church plus four others from the street who have been service users. Everyone volunteers with cooking and handing out meals, creating a fun environment where all are eager to get involved.

Q. How many people use your service and who are they?

Between 75 to 100 people access our service regularly, Wednesdays attract 30 to 50 people, Saturdays attract about 50 to 75 and Sunday 10 to 15 regulars. Most of our users are street people with a tragic story who need a listening ear. Their profile varies: drug users, alcoholics, victims of domestic violence or abuse. A lot are young, running away from home. It takes very little to lose one's way in life.







Our team

Q. Who funds your group?

We have been surviving on donations from the church; this is collected from the Church goers. There is no regular income from any resource. Hence accessing the help of HCVS to set up as a unincorporated organisation and attract funding, so we can continue the service and help even more people.

Q. How do you see the group developing over the next 12 months?

We would like to obtain a building to provide short-term accommodation, a drop-in centre providing clothing, toiletries, a hot meal and advice on benefits, housing and employment. Future plans also include a free phone line where a member of the street team could offer practical advice in getting support from organisations in Hackney. CEN: Building up environmental action in Hackney

refreshed Hackney **Environment Network** (HEN) promises a renewed drive for green action in Hackney. Funded by a £3.000 cross cutting network grant from the Community **Empowerment Network (CEN), HEN officially launched last** month when Dalston's Arcola Theatre threw open its doors to over 100 people for a community environment conference.

CEN funded Hackney Environment Network brings together Hackney Environment and Hackney Parks Forums. Both have been active in the borough for over 20 years.

Both Forum chairs, Russell Miller and Amy Erickson, opened the event which attracted local people looking to get involved in local environmental initiatives as well as local voluntary and community sector (VCS) organisationns. These included Parks Groups, Growing Communities. Tree Musketeers. **Hackney Community** Environment Project, Hackney's Transition Town projects.

The emphasis was on enabling people to share information and ideas on how to make Hackney a more sustainable and enjoyable place to live, through five workshops (listed opposite). Councillor Sophie Linden, **Dalston Ward Cabinet Member** for Customer Services and Sustainability, and Chair of the CEN, Mary Cannon each spoke about what the council and the CEN are doing and answered questions. GEN: Making connections

EN's cross cutting grants from Team Hackney were designed to develop VCS networks whose work cut across Team Hackney's five priority work areas and Boards: Children & Young People, Better Homes, Thriving Healthy, Safer, Cleaner and Economic Development. The aim was to support these networks and bring the views of their members to Team Hackney, the local strategic partnership, where decisions on services in Hackney are made. Linking up with the CEN has enabled HEN to become the key community partner on Team Hackney's Sustainable Environment Subgroup.

Local councils are increasingly required to be proactive and develop environment policies together with the community. For example, Hackney's Local Area Agreement, which sets out priorities for the borough and is how the Government measures Hackney Council, has a reduction on CO2 emissions as one of its top 35 national indicators.

James Palmer, Head of Partnerships at Team Hackney, said: 'We're looking forward to working with the CEN, who've nominated representatives from Hackney Environment Network to get involved in the work of the Partnership.' ① Liz Hughes 2 : 020 7923 1962 2: liz@hcvs.org.uk

CEN: Update on work on Fuel Poverty

n the last SPARK, we reported that CEN rep Wayne Hincks, had helped establish a Fuel Poverty Working Group within Team Hackney. Fuel Poverty is when a household spends more than 10% of its household income on energy to maintain a normal living room temperature of 21 degrees and 18 degrees in other areas. Wayne describes work so far: 'Together with support from Meg Hillier MP, academics and other experts in this area, we've spent a lot of time researching the extent of fuel poverty in Hackney, this will guide the next steps to developing a response to meet local people's needs. But we need to keep on this as a lot of time is passing since establishing the working group in November. Our work on the research and building an advice network needs to translate quickly to an action before next winter approaches, we expect this to be addressed through alignment to the Sustainable Environment agenda and Team Hackney commissioning on Energy Efficiency. At the CEN we are very conscious that with the current economic climate, more and more people are facing new hardships and need support.' At HCVS we believe that the best solutions to this are often found at the heart of the community, The Learning Trust commissioned us to run the Believe to Achieve grants programme for voluntary and community sector (VCS) groups. Putting the environment at the top of the agenda

Green champion: **Michael Calderbank**



I've involved myself in local environmental activities since I came to Hackney 20 years ago. | joined Hackney Environment Forum (HEF), Hackney's umbrella environmental group, and I've been secretary since 1993. HEF supports local groups and networking through the website, the production of Hackney's Big Green Map and events such as Hackney Green Drinks.

HEF jumped at the chance of a **CEN** grant to work with Hackney Parks Forum, to build on the work we've done to build a larger inclusive network. Five of us from the two fora got together as a steering group. We hired a project worker to help with outreach work and making new links with, for example, BAMER organisations and tenants and faith groups who are not always linked in with environmental groups. We also organised a conference to bring people together, discuss key issues and to shape the future of Hackney Environment Network.

At the conference, at least twenty people put their names down to take the process forward and together we will develop the network. Other

volunteers are welcome. We need to work out the best ways to pull together common themes, move forward with agreed goals and achieve change.

Like the conference. I hope the network continues to address a wide range of issues that reflect local concerns and opportunities as well as the major issues of today such as climate change. But it depends on who gets involved and what they want do. The whole point of the network is to be

inclusive and collaborative and not serve the people who shout loudest or groups that are best resourced. A key issue will inevitably be how the VCS can get its voice heard.

The network's only in its very first stage but it's off to a good start.

At the conference, we had promises from Cllr Sophie Linden, Cabinet Member for Customer Services & Sustainability, to work more with us on environmental issues, to ensure better representation on the new Sustainable Evironment sub-group of Team Hackney and to clarify who's who in Hackney Council.

Over the years, it's been difficult to get the council and others to improve their environmental policies and performance.

Successive council regimes have failed to work well with the voluntary and community sector (VCS), to open up the decision-making process or to take environmental issues seriously. The council seems to have viewed the environment and sustainability issues as an



unnecessary and unaffordable luxury, secondary to other issues. Instead, we all need to understand that a good healthy environment underpins overall well-being. Sustainable development should be the overarching principle guiding all other work. Hopefully the situation is changing.

CEN has helped with funding our outreach and research work and with putting us in touch with several other Hackney networks that focus on other issues but clearly want to have their voices heard on environmental issues.

In the future, we will be helping us to try and secure funding for the network. There's only so much volunteers can do in their spare time, paid workers would give us the capacity to make even more links with people who are still underrepresented in the network and to keep everyone informed of progress.

I hope the network can take us to places we've never been before in Hackney, where there's a cultural change that puts the environment high up the agenda and where the council and other statutory bodies willingly maintain an open dialogue with grassroots activists and operate in a more transparent way. It's the only way we're going to tackle things like climate change and the loss of biodiversity and build a better future where people feel included and can reach their potential.
