IIntroducing Mobile Repair Service

obile Repair Service provides a wide range of practical help around the home to disabled and to older people living in Hackney at low-cost or free of charge. For example, a blind person can have their washing machine plumbed in by a plumber they can trust - all staff are employed directly and have undertaken CRB checks - for a labour charge of £5 per half hour.

As well as plumbing, the service, which has 25 years experience, can help with gas appliances, heating, electrics and appliances as well as carpentry and home maintenance.

Mobile Repair Service supports national policy to help vulnerable people retain their independence as long as possible. Director, Alistair Wallace, said that, 'Older and disabled people often have least access to technology even though they need it most.'

The service also provides a safety check for any older person and fits the remedial equipment identified free of charge as part of their Stop Falls project. This practical project also provides classes and home tuition to help older people exercise to improve strength and balance aiming to prevent accidents before they happen and ease pressure on the health service. ◆

CEN: Health priorities for Hackney's refugees

Hackney Refugee Forum

Ii Aksoy is Hackney Council for Voluntary Service (HCVS) Refugee Health Coordinator and Chair of Hackney Refugee Forum (HRF). Here Ali updates SPARK on work to improve life in Hackney for our refugee and migrant communities.

Mental health, access to health services and domestic violence are the major health problems affecting migrant and refugee communities.

This came out of an evaluation of the health needs of our communities conducted in the Spring. We wanted to identify issues which need to be considered to improve the health of refugees, asylum seekers and migrants and to invest in improving health provision to meet these needs.

Our research made these recommendations for local health authorities to provide:

- clear information
- evidence based planning
- advice on entitlements to health services
- better publicity in different languages
- trained health staff who know which health services refugee and asylum seekers are entitled to.

Nine people completed our Accountancy course in July. We are planning a new one for the Autumn. If you are interested, contact me below.

Broadening our reach through advocacy and representation.

Hackney Local Involvement Network or LINk is a network where local people can influence how healthcare is delivered. I now sit on their Steering Committee, so will be working with them on our communities' needs.

Hackney Funding Programme closes on 22 September. With HCVS, we are holding application support workshops for refugee and migrantled community groups. The next is in early September. Contact me if you are interested.

Educators Forum ESOL Network

esearch into how local Turkish and Kurdish people learn English through English for Speakers of Other Language (ESOL) courses highlights large numbers of people who not only don't progress beyond a basic level, but a growing number who aren't aware that ESOL support is there.

Key points of the research:

- Teaching affects participation training needs to be addressed by some ESOL centres
- Social and economic dimensions play a significant role in educational success. For example, childcare or paid work local and central agencies should join up to solve this
- Link between achieving a higher level of ESOL and finding stable employment and integrating into British society. A higher level of education in Turkey helps this.

the big issue: hackney's vcs strategy

Vision for Hackney

hich voluntary and community sector (VCS) services are most important to Hackney people? In the current financial climate, the way Hackney's VCS operates will have to adapt. To insure the best approach for local people, HCVS is working with the VCS, Hackney Council and Team Hackney to develop a ten-year VCS strategy. A draft will go out to consultation in the Autumn, so everyone can have their say.

The strategy is being developed by an external organisation, NAVCA (National Association for Voluntary and Community Action), with the intention of providing an unbiased perspective on Hackney's VCS. Research began in January with a complete review of existing VCS data, but emphasis is being given to the views of Hackney's inhabitants.

HCVS and NAVCA held a Visioning Event on 24 May to discuss the findings in more detail. Over forty people attended, including senior representatives of public bodies, the voluntary sector and the CEN.

"The event was enormously useful," says Karl Frisby, HCVS Chair, who attended. "I feel proud that we've made a stand on what we feel are local priorities."

HCVS Trustee Eileen Bellot who also runs Hands Inc, a community health



and wellbeing organisation said, "The visioning event brought together a good cross section of people from the voluntary, community and public sectors. By all accounts, there were a lot of sounds from the public sector that they want to embrace what we do in order to work at building effective partnerships. I found it useful to meet and put a few faces to names of some of the more senior staff within the public sector."

Some of the issues discussed at the event included:

Funding

The sector's future financial stability is the most challenging area for the strategy. The full extent of the national spending cuts won't be known until the Government announces the results of its spending review on October 20, but until then the sector must prepare for significant changes.

lan Lewis, Director of Partnerships at Hackney Council, echoed these sentiments. "We are entering a new and more challenging era where the role of the VCS will increasingly fall under the spotlight, both locally and nationally," he said. "At the same time, fewer funds will be available. This means the VCS and the public sector will need to plan and work together even more effectively to provide better services to the people who need them most."

Partnership working

The VCS has proven success in partnership working with public services and businesses, thanks to initiatives such as the Hackney Compact. But duplication of services within the VCS needs to reduce to maintain future efficiency.

"It doesn't mean a group has to go out of business, but it might mean you have to focus on the things

you're good at and away from things other organisations do better." says Neil Cleeveley, Director of Policy and Communications at NAVCA, who is in charge of the project.

Demonstrating impact

Many organisations find impact measurement a burden, but with tightening public finances, demonstrating value will rise in importance.

"It's a good time to push funders and decision-makers to rethink the kind of benefit analysis they make and actually look at the social return on investment," says Karl.

The overall response to the event was positive. "Nothing forces local authorities to work with the VCS or build a strategy with us," said Karl. "I see this as a genuine attempt to capture what we're doing well."

"I think there's a real willingness to try to tackle the difficulties and to put the people of Hackney first," said Neil. "The strategy is a real opportunity for the sector to set out its concerns as we enter into very difficult times.

It's also an opportunity to work in partnership to turn government rhetoric about Big Society into something than is meaningful to the thousands of people that work or currently volunteer in the sector.

At HCVS, we will be thinking about what we need to do to support local organisations and how we can make the most of opportunities for the sector to play an even bigger role in society."

"There are going to be some difficult decisions so it's important people express a clear view on the priorities," says Neil. "We're trying to create a space for people to tell us whether we've got it right and how to deal with these matters."

From October, the first draft of the strategy will be available on the HCVS website along with an online survey. HCVS are also organising four consultation sessions for targeted groups. The consultation will be open for a minimum of 12 weeks. The results will help NAVCA develop an Action Plan for publication in March 2011. Written by Gabriella Józwiak

The strategy will strengthen the role of the sector as strategic partner in shaping Hackney's future and will increase opportunities for more involvement in designing and delivering services as well as build the capacity of the sector.

The challenges will be to an inclusive framework to include small BME organisations as it is identified that 70% of the identified organisations are very small and a disproportionate number are BME.

Maintaining grants will be another challenge, particularly supporting good projects to become mainstreamed through commissioning .

The Huddleston Centre: A place for disabled children to go and have fun

The Huddleston Centre in Hackney has existed now for over 30 years. It was started by a group of parents who wanted somewhere where their disabled children could go, meet with friends and have fun. The Charities mission is to support disabled young people and their families living in Hackney, not only through providing youth clubs and holiday activities but also through informal support and education.

Cassandra Delisser, pictured left, is a youth project manager and has been at the centre for twelve years. She says 'The centre is important because it really brings out the confidence of the children, you can see their development. It gives them opportunities they might not

normally get because of funding and access requirements. Lots of our children and young adults have been coming here every day say, from when they are six to 25 years of age. We don't have the funding to keep them after 25 so one of the hardest things is letting them leave, especially when they don't always have an immediate place to go.'

Nick Davies, pictured below left, says, 'For the future we hope to rediversify funding for our current services plus start some new services for older young people as this is an area where provision is currently lacking. As with all VCS organisations at this time, we are concerned with possible cut-backs in funding and are currently building up a pro-active volunteer support group to actively fundraise for us.

Step by Step: Cycling awards

The Huddleston Centre: Thumi (pictured right) is twelve years old and comes to the centre every day including a Saturday. She says, "I like it because my friends Ellie and Thomas are here. We play on the computer and listen to music."



Step by Step: On your bike, get set, go!

Chippy Flohr works as director for Step by Step, an organisation which supports three - 19 year olds with special needs from the Orthodox Jewish Community in Hackney.

With nine children of her own, Chippy has been working in the play sector for nineteen years and says 'I think I'll be here for a while.

Our range of activities at Step by Step includes biking, sailing, kayaking, swimming, horseriding, ice-skating, football, Sunday Club and Holiday playschemes. All children are supported with a one to one volunteer for all sports activities, and we operate with two groups aged two to 13 years-old, and 13 plus.

Most of our children are medium to high level need disabled, which includes Down's Syndrome, autism and the visually impaired. Many children with disabilities are denied the chance to exercise as the mainstream sports activities are not catered towards their individual needs; this lack of

access to physical activities is also a problem for some within the Orthodox Jewish Community due to religious requirements.

One of our successes in combating the lack of access to sports activities for disabled children was our 2009 Community cycling award for £4,918, to fund weekly cycling sessions and use of specialist pool bikes.

We worry about funding like everyone else, especially the Hackney council short breaks funding, but I know that often the council are unsure too and as with all public sector spending cuts, the whole country isn't sure.

Recently during our Summer Playscheme our theme was Transport where each day featured a different vehicles of transport. On aeroplane day we took the children to city airport, another day was parachutes, and we even had fire engines on fire engine day. We had all the children playing with hoses in helmets, it was fantastic.' >>

Universal Board Games: Playing Together



Vicky and Mem, pictured above, set up Universal Board Games in 2000. They were play workers in Islington and decided to set up a project bringing young people and families together playing games. Vicky says, 'We spent an entire summer playing Monopoly and thought there must be more in this. A decade later, we now specialise in using board games as a dynamic, interactive tool for social education and consultation.

As well as taking the games to big outdoor events like Parks for Life and Total Play Days in Gillett Square, we go to schools where they can design their own games. We teamed up with ecoACTIVE and Groundwork last November, working with primary schools to produce a game about transition to secondary school

called Challenge Tree. Every week we visited the schools, played games and made changes to the game design. The challenge is trying to include all the children's ideas because there's certainly no shortage of them.

By playing and testing the mock up games the team naturally select the best ideas and end up with a really fun informative game. The game we finished with was a big tree with lots of challenges along the way so it starts with finding out about your secondary school place and ends up with going to the year 7 Christmas party as settled secondary school kids.

Mem says 'we have lots of ideas for future projects for example designing a game about the rights of children in Care. Our next challenge is to recruit a secretary and treasurer so that we have a board of trustees and can secure more funding for projects like this. At the moment, UBG is a partnership with social aims and objectives.'

One day UBG would like to set up a Community games centre where young and old fathers and sons and the whole community can meet and play together. >>

Hackney Play Association: Working together for Quality in Play

Hackney Play Association is a network of play associations and play networks. They are working hard to demonstrate the importance of high quality play opportunities for children.

Hackney Play Association is an infrastructure organisation, seemingly small but with an inclusive play project working in the field, they offer capacity building and training, including short courses on playwork funded by The Learning Trust. Hackney Play's core funding comes from LB Hackney.

Director Nicola Butler explains, 'we have the same concerns as the rest of the voluntary sector about the impact of cuts on local communities.'

VCS play organisations are likely to feel the effects of a 50% cut to the Play Pathfinder budget nationwide in 2010-11. Originally, Hackney was awarded £2.7

million, over two years, by the Department of Schools, Children and Families (DCSF) to implement the Play Pathfinder scheme.

Hackney has used the funding to develop 29 new play areas and to completely refurbish its four voluntary sector adventure playgrounds with state of the art facilities for children and young people. The new playgrounds are designed for inclusive play and to enable children to experience a wide range of new activities and adventures.

One of the most positive steps Hackney has taken is to build the new playgrounds in housing estates so that children could play out close to home. Now that the fund has been cut, Nicola is keen that the new facilities are looked after and maintained. 'We need to ensure that the pathfinder investment is looked after and that children and young people can continue to enjoy and benefit for years to come, especially those from disadvantaged communities.'

In Hackney alone, 41% of children are in families on out of work benefits. Hackney Play Association is now, as Nicola puts it, 'trying to get some level of sustainability with less government support.'

Hackney CEN: Negotiating funding cuts

Following the creation of the Coalition Government in May, and the £6 billion of in-year public sector cuts announced in June, Hackney Council asked the local strategic partnership, Team Hackney, to agree local savings from the Area Based Grant worth a total of £2.5 million this year. With representation on PIE (Team Hackney's Performance Intelligence and Equalities group), the CEN has been involved in helping to ensure that the voluntary and community sector is not disproportionately affected. Next year's Government cuts will be announced at the Comprehensive Spending Review on 20 October.

SPARK attended a meeting organised by the CEN to discuss the cuts, and look at what the government's concept of the Big Society might mean for Hackney. Of immediate concern to the CEN was the impact that cuts this year would have on the many VCS projects which are funded through the ABG, and ultimately on the diverse communities served by these projects.

years and it's very likely that Team Hackney will have much less money available to fund the range of VCS organisations and programmes it currently invests in. This year's cuts have not disproportionately affected the VCS so it's important that this is maintained in decisions made about spending next year. We need to continue to be in dialogue with the Council and partners to ensure the sector doesn't lose out.

We also need to ensure the impact of any cuts doesn't disproportionately affect particular communities in Hackney. Team Hackney has given the go ahead for a longer term VCS strategy (see page 8) which should mean a discussion of positive ways of dealing with the funding crisis in partnership'.

Speaking about the start of these conversations, CEN chair Mary Cannon, acknowledged "It's important that we are still partners in the process even if we occasionally worry about not being equal."

Director of Partnership at Hackney Council Ian Lewis said, "Now more than ever strong partnership is crucial if we are going to continue to improve outcomes for local people and the VCS will continue to have a very significant role as we plan for the future.

Yes there will be tough discussions and decisions but I feel the strength and the maturity of the partnership will stand us in good stead as we move forward".

Next steps:

The recommendations from this meeting will be written up into papers showing how Hackney's VCS can contribute to future Local Area Agreement targets and the Big Society and Total Place agendas.

"My youth organisation Yo! has been asked to consider different scenarios for cuts from 10 to 20%. It's been suggested we send workers out alone to cut costs, but you can't send youth workers out on to the street on their own, it's illegal. So this is a blunt cut, which makes things really difficult."

HCVS Inspiring Young Hackney SkyWay

kyWay's Natalie Roast spoke to SPARK about their peer project. "SkyWay has always recognised the enterprising potential of young people in Hackney. This funding has allowed us to turn that potential into a reality.

Our peer project aims to work with 40 young people aged between 16 and 25 years, to encourage and motivate them to achieve a sports qualification and get employment to run at least three sports sessions to gain work experience.

So far, we've proved highly successful, between October 2009 and March 2010 we recruited 15 peers. Of these, all gained work experience and have been paid to run three or more sessions.

Plus:

- One gained employment as a youth worker
- One gained employment as a project worker
- Six run weekly sports sessions in the local community
- Six completed the Football Association's (FA) refereeing course.

We are recruiting 20 new peers to start in September. The FA level 1 in coaching will be part of this programme.

Action Learning Sets are small group sessions, we discuss issues and everyone feeds in with their suggestions. You learn from each other. So far, they have worked really well - people have swapped numbers to continue this support outside of these sessions.

Action Learner, Janet Murungi (above right) from Rise Community Action said, "The Action Learning Sets facilitated at HCVS by Kishore have been very helpful to me because I have found it an innovative way of learning. We get to learn from each other and share ideas in group. Since I've come to this group, my knowledge of how to approach larger funding applications has increased. I shall use tools gained to help me to complete my Hackney Grants application and any future fundraising work. I highly recommend it to community organisations."

Hospital and Prison Action Network



athaniel Oyinloye, above, has been on the HCVS information mailing list for seven years but only became a paid member and started renting desk space at HCVS last year.

Nathaniel's organisation is Hospital and Prison Action Network (HPAN). HPAN started in 2003 and worked hard to define its objectives before registering with the charity commission in April 2005.

Nathaniel says the desk space has been useful for meeting other organisations like Development Impact For Nigeria, Hackney Refugee Form, and the Somalian Women's Network. HCVS staff are helpful and it is cheaper than an office. "It's easier to maintain than my own office because of the cleaners, it's more sociable and we also benefit from laminating, photocopying and printing facilities'.

Nathaniel aims to reduce young people reoffending through early intervention, and finding out what young offenders really want to do. Using Awards for All funding, HPAN visit various hospitals and prisons across UK, at family member's requests. They have five part time volunteer outreach workers.

'Every day I try to reply to emails and see if there are any appointments for our volunteers to make visits. I come to HCVS from Monday to Friday; I'm a full time volunteer. I pay for desk space at HCVS one day a week, on the other days I use the HCVS communal area'. • KP

Evergreen Play Association

SPARK spoke to Pat
Macantsionnaigh from
Evergreen Play Association,
an adventure playground in
Dalston, about working in
the Play sector and being an
inclusion worker.

I've been at Evergreen since 2003.

I started as a support worker, I did Saturdays and holidays and then took up the Inclusion Project Playleader post in 2006 after finishing a degree in Biomedical Science. The biomedical science is surprisingly useful as it helps me to understand some of the more complex disabilities. Inclusive play means that children with disabilities are integrated into mainstream play sites. So as an inclusion playleader I act as first point of contact, making sure specialist support is in place through play to promote the child's social and physical needs whilst they play.

The challenge is always keeping the funding going and filling gaps.

Lots of playgrounds just rely on one funding programme, but at Evergreen, we have lots of different pots of funding for different activities. I put in about nine applications for funding over the past two months; we apply for the Hackney funding programme yearly, and all our "Lots of the children come from segregated schools where they might not be given the opportunity to play with children from different backgrounds with different abilities. support workers come through fundraising from BBC Children in Need, The Sobell Foundation and The Learning Trust.

I think it's important for the playground to continue to diversify its funding streams and stay linked up with the other playgrounds in Hackney, who we share a minibus with. We can also keep working alongside other playgrounds to improve our training.

We get corporate volunteers every six to eight weeks or so and that helps, as there's always something to be done like repairing fences or general maintenance.

At Evergreen, we welcome deaf children to the playground and I have a British Sign Language (BSL) qualification Level 2.

We always make sure there's

a staff member who can use BSL on site. Lots of hearing children are using sign language to communicate with other deaf children, and if there are enough children who are interested we run sessions in BSL, starting with the alphabet and then and simple conversation.

The children pick it up very quickly and it's a great skill for them to learn when they're young as it stays with you. In the same way, the children are very accepting of children with autism or Down's Syndrome, and play alongside each other. They can take this understanding into other walks of life.

We recently ran a one day course, inviting playworkers from across the borough to take part in Makaton training to raise awareness about autistic needs.
